In other Lutheran churches, it's customary that in September, there is a "Rally Day" to celebrate the children and the beginning of a new Sunday School year. Here at St. Paul, Kari Jackson is working on beginning a new Sunday School year for OUR three kids. But at St. Paul, we will have our Rally Day on September 29 to celebrate folks who have decided to become new "official" members of St. Paul Lutheran Church. So far, we will be welcoming new brothers and sisters. Kate Lovan and Alex Oden and their twins, Clara and Elana, and we will be welcoming Pastor Joe's sister. Jan Albrecht. And I know others are thinking about it because I have handed out many membership forms. So today, I want to talk just a little bit about reasons that do NOT require you to become a member of Saint Paul.

First, you don't need to become a member of Saint Paul just because it will make the pastor look good, even though it might make the pastor look good. When the people up the chain of command look and see how things are going at Saint Paul and see that we have new members, maybe someone will say, "Oh, that Linda Marousek must be doing a good job." But making the pastor look good is not a good reason to join a church.

And second, you don't need to become a member of St. Paul just because it will make St. Paul

look good! Maybe it will make St. Paul look good because this little old church is growing instead of dying, but that is not a good reason to join the church.

A political organizer said that signing on the dotted line is a good way to make sure that people keep their commitments, like their commitment to register to vote or to go vote So if you sign up for membership, under that theory, you would be more likely to do what you say you will for the church, like pull weeds, or give an offering. But we are all grown-ups here, and if you say you will do something, I trust that you will do it. Joining so we can guarantee you keep your commitments is not a good reason to join the church.

But here is a good reason to join the church. Martin Luther, as he was dying, wrote, "We are beggars. This is true." Luther said this after a lifetime of devotion, study, teaching, and writing about faith, and what he meant was what God had taught him from the beginning: that faith is a gift of God, not something one can earn by good deeds or even by membership in a Lutheran Church. The main reason to be a member and to attend regularly is not so much that we would be committed to doing more, but rather that we would receive more, and this more is overwhelmingly the spiritual gifts God wants us to have - forgiveness, salvation, and the assurance that since Baptism, we have already been living forever. These are gifts that are only available where He said He'd meet us - as a part of the body of Christ.

And personally, I am a beggar. So, I am happy to be a member of this body of Christ. What about you?

St. Paul hosted an art exhibit in August featuring icon artists

Lori McDonald and Brenda Johnston The Contemporary Iconography Group Exhibition will share the works of contemporary icon writers, informing, educating, and illustrating the practice to our community.

Of the icon painting tradition that developed in Byzantium, with Constantinople as the chief city, we have only a few icons from the 11th century and none preceding them, in part because of the Iconoclastic reforms during which many were destroyed or lost.

Icon artists at St. Paul cont.

Today, the practice continues to be handed down and taught through a mentoring practice. An experienced "teacher" will share the tradition. The apprentice eventually moves out on their own, sharing this

practice with others.

One icon painter and practitioner, Lori McDonald, shared.

"I began painting icons in 2017 at a workshop at St. Placid's Priory in Lacey, Washington. I discovered the significance of this craft when the instructor explained that iconography was not just painting but a form of prayer for the artist."

"I use the traditional method of painting with egg tempera, which involves mixing egg yolk with water and pigments applied to a gessoed

wood panel. The haloes are made of 23-karat gold. Most of the icons I paint are in a Byzantine Slavic style. I don't create the patterns; instead, I use ancient patterns, each with

various symbols that hold Our Lady of the Universe, egg deep meaning. Icons are painted from dark to light,

in contrast to many other painting styles, as each icon is meant to bring the light of Christ into the world."

"I find great fulfillment in this art. This practice has helped to deepen my faith."
